ACCREDITATION UPDATE

In December, ACPH completed the application phase of an ACCREDITATION process that all Ohio health departments must complete by July 2020. The process measures a health department's performance against nationally recognized standards, or domains, by examining extensive documentation of ACPH's efforts to improve and protect the health of Allen County residents. The application process culminated with a site visit in December of 2018. Final determination by the National Public Health Accreditation Board will not be made until sometime in 2019. The National Public Health Accreditation Board evaluates health departments in the following 12 Domains of Public Health:



PUBLIC HEALTH FUNDING IN ALLEN COUNTY, 2018





The Nursing Services Area continues to offer quality, confidential and private family planning services to men and women in our Reproductive Health and Wellness Clinic. Patients seen in our clinic receive a comprehensive physical examination as well as sexually-transmitted infection (STI) testing. Gynecological and contraceptive services are also provided. TB skin testing continues to be available on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 8-9 and 3-4 on a walk-in basis. Immunizations are offered for children and adults. Immunizations are available by appointment on Wednesdays and Thursdays. Our communicable disease nurses and epidemiologist investigated over 1,400 reportable diseases during 2018. Our county continues to have some of the highest rates of Chlamydia and gonorrhea in Ohio. 615 cases of Chlamydia and 299 cases of gonorrhea were reported in Allen County in 2018. Communicable disease staff work very hard to follow up on each and every disease report that is received in order to decrease the spread of disease and protect the health of residents in our community.

The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, And Children continues to support the health and nutrition of Allen County families. Currently more than 2,300 individuals participate in the Allen County WIC Program. Participants are seeing changes as we strive to reach our evermore mobile population. WIC increased their outreach through ACPH social media to provide nutrition tips, breastfeeding information, recipes, and program updates. In addition, a new text messaging program was initiated to get out "need to know" information to our participants about their appointments and/or special bulletins.

Food packages for eligible children provided an increase in fruit and vegetable dollars in 2018, and work is underway to increase fruits and vegetables further next year. Through community outreach and individual participation, WIC will continue to work to make optimal nutrition an attainable goal for Allen County families.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH SERVICES AREA

Ohio's Household Sewage Treatment System (HSTS) program has seen significant changes made across the state since 2015 to improve surface water quality and protect public health. Ohio law calls for the implementation and expansion of local Operation and Maintenance (O&M) programs throughout the state to provide better oversite of these systems. State oversight into local health department programs has begun, aimed to ensure uniform application across Ohio. ACPH's sewage program was surveyed by the Ohio Department of Health during 2018. The final report is pending. To help homeowners increase the life and performance of a HSTS it is important to provide educational materials, which can be used by residents to protect their investment and the environment. Allen County is ahead of the curve as O&M programs began here in 1972. To date, more than 4,700 HSTS are in our O&M inspection programs. During 2017 and 2018, our records of sewage system installation permits and site drawings were loaded into the Allen County GIS mapping system. Now, a homeowner with an HSTS on one of our O&M programs may view the installation permit information and the approved site plans for their property on our web page. In addition, a wealth of information regarding the operation of sewage systems is available there. VITAL STATISTICS

The Vital Statistics office files records for births and deaths that occur in Lima, Delphos, and all of Allen County. Ohio law only allows for the issuance of certified copies of birth and death records. Our office can issue **Certified Birth Certificates** for all births occurring in the State of Ohio. Any births outside of Ohio must be requested directly from that state. Our office issues **Death Certificates** for Allen County deaths only. Certificates for deaths occurring outside of Allen County must be obtained from the county where the death occurred. We accept cash, money order or cashier's check (no personal checks). We also offer the use of a debit/credit card machine with an additional usage fee applied to the cardholder. When possible, Vital Statistics staff issues copies while customers wait – approximately 10 minutes. On-line ordering is available via a link on our website: www.allencountypublichealth.org.

HEALTH PLANNING SERVICES

Health Planning Services staff work in the areas of public health accreditation, public health emergency preparedness and epidemiology, and community health improvement.

2018 marked the 100-year anniversary of the deadliest flu in history - the 1918 pandemic flu, killing some 675,000 Americans. Although this type of flu doesn't happen often, updating and exercising plans aimed to stop, slow or limit the spread of a pandemic with partners in public health, health care, and emergency management is critical for limiting suffering and lives lost. In the fall of 2018, staff exercised the scenario of a pandemic influenza in participation with our county and regional partners.

In 2018, community partners met to update the Allen County Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP). The partners chose to continue work in 4 areas where we could have the most impact in our community. These areas are Substance Use and Mental Health, Chronic Disease Prevention, Maternal and Infant Health, and Housing and Public Transportation. Multiple coalitions and partners are working to address these CHIP priorities, including the West Central Ohio Health Ministries Program. PREVENTION & HEALTH PROMOTION SERVICES

To overcome health disparities, or health concerns that affect specific groups more than others, ACPH provides programs that strive to make a positive impact on a population of people. Prevention and Health Promotion Services at ACPH include the following:



The infant mortality rate for African-American babies is 2-3 times higher than the for white babies. The Moms & Babies First program conducted 1,200 home visits to pregnant African-American women or new moms in 2018.

Additionally, over 400 portable cribs were distributed through the Cribs for Kids program to eligible families in Allen County so that newborns and infants would have a safe place to sleep.

During 2018, 310 Naloxone kits were distributed to individuals concerned that they or someone they cared about might overdose on opiates. ACPH is aware of 6 overdose reversals that occurred as a result of this distribution.





To help populations overcome obesity, Creating Healthy Communities helped communities encourage Active Living and Healthy Living in 2018: bikes provided to workplaces for active commutes to meetings; sidewalk access improved to Faurot Park; Safe Routes to School activities conducted in Delphos; community gardens planted in Lima; Farmer's Market founded in Delphos; and healthy eating policies in worksites throughout Allen County.

ALLEN COUNTY BOARD OF HEALTH

The health of Allen County residents depends upon the knowledge and vigilance of our public health workforce, which includes nurses, health educators, environmental health specialists, nutritionists, breastleeding counselors, administrative and support personnel, a social worker and community health workers at Allen County Public Health. The activities of the public health work force are overseen by the Allen County Board of Health.

As established in Ohio law, the seven member Board of Health is our policy-making body with authority to adopt regulations and establish programs to promote public health within the district. Board members during 2018 included: Wilfred Ellis, MD, President, Eric Kerner, Vice President; Marva Cowan, Janis Carse, Scott Shutt, Ross Kauffman and Pratap Balusu, MD.

Janis Carse will be completing her term on the Board as of March 31, 2019. Her dedicated service since her appointment by the District Advisory Council in 2003 is much appreciated. The District Advisory Council will appoint a new Board member at their Annual Meeting in March.

Six of the Board members are appointed through the mayors, township trustees, and county commissioners of Allen County. The seventh member is a physician appointed by the other Board members. The Board meets at 8:00 a.m. on the second Friday of each month, and meetings are open to the public.
