

What is Moms & Babies First?

Moms & Babies First is a voluntary service for eligible pregnant women that promotes black infant vitality by supporting healthy pregnancies and positive birth outcomes. The program is at no cost, and provides in-home visits during and after pregnancy, from birth through the 1st year of life.

Who Is Eligible?

- Pregnant African American women
- · High risk Pregnancy
- Reside in Allen County



What are the Goals?

- Decrease African American maternal and infant mortality
- 2. Improving maternal, infant, and family health
- 3. Reduce health disparities
- 4. Empowering family resilience

What Does the Program Offer?

- Home visits
- Linkage to prenatal care and primary care providers
- Comprehensive assessment and screening
- Informed curriculum designed to reduce infant mortality
- Healthy behaviors (nutrition, safe sleep, breastfeeding, immunizations, etc.)
- Assisting the development of family goals
- Referrals to community agencies



Who Provides the Home Visits?

- The service is provided by Certified Community Health Workers (CCHWs).
- CCHWs are trained, trusted, knowledgeable health personnel, who typically reside or come from the communities they serve.
- CCHWs bridge cultural and linguistic barriers, expand access to coverage and care, improve health outcomes and are vital links between the community and the health care system
- CCHWs reduce health disparities, contribute to improving the quality of care, cultural competence, and empower individuals and communities to strive for better health.
